Jack and Doris Shadbolt Fellowship in the Humanities Program Relaunch

The Faculty of Arts & Social Sciences at Simon Fraser University invites applications for **Jack and Doris Shadbolt Fellows in the Humanities** for the 2019–20 academic year.

The Jack and Doris Shadbolt Fellowship Program in the Humanities, supported by the Jack and Doris Shadbolt Endowment for the Humanities, exists to promote the humanities and arts — broadly conceived — as important sites of creative practice and critical engagement with the major concerns of our times. Jack and Doris Shadbolt Fellows will be emerging or established engaged academic scholars, artists, knowledge keepers, practitioners or writers in the humanities and arts who will help us imagine how we can make the world we live in better through acts of world-making in the creative arts and/or publicly engaged scholarship in the humanities. Jack and Doris Shadbolt Fellows in the Humanities will engage in activities while in residence that may include, but are not limited to, teaching, research, and community and public outreach. Through their performance, creation, research, and other interactions with faculty and students in these activities, they will enhance not only their own intellectual and creative horizons but also that of the university and wider community.

SFU operates year-round, with Fall, Spring, and Summer terms, of four months each; normally, fellowships will be held for one academic year (September to August), but can be held for one or two terms (September to December and/or January to April and/or May to August). The stipend associated with the fellowship is **CAD 20,000 per term** (up to CAD 60,000 for a year).

Over the course of their fellowship, as part of the set of activities undertaken while in residence, Jack and Doris Shadbolt Fellows in the Humanities will be expected to deliver at least one public lecture, performance, or other form of community or public outreach based on their projects. They will also be expected to be available for informal, occasional consultations with students and faculty.

Applicants will be asked to upload current CV and a cover letter outlining the following:

1. The project the applicant intends to take up during the fellowship;
2. The desired primary unit affiliation in the Faculty of Arts & Social Sciences, as well as secondary unit affiliation, as applicable (secondary units may be any unit within SFU, and are not restricted to FASS);
3. Length of fellowship desired;
4. Names and contact information of two references.
